Information for children coming into hospital theatres during Coronavirus (COVID-19) – Summer 2020

The start of the journey

Our doctors have decided they would like you to have a procedure in hospital. We want to make sure you, your family and carers are safe when you come to see us.

You have probably heard people talking about Coronavirus (COVID-19). It is a tiny germ that can cause a serious infection in some people. To make sure we keep everyone safe, we have to ask you to follow a special journey plan.



Keeping safe before your operation

We will ask you and your family to stay away from crowded places and parties before your operation.

This means you or your family are less likely to catch the infection before the operation.

This is important because we don't want you to miss your operation because you or your family are poorly.

You can still play games, read books and have fun with your family on trips outdoors.

You can also still go to school.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) nose and throat swabs

About three days before your visit to the hospital, you will have a swab done to make sure you don't have Coronavirus (COVID-19). This will be done at a small testing centre within the hospital grounds.

The swab is done with a cotton bud that the nurse will use to tickle your throat and nostril. It doesn't really hurt and it is done super-fast, but it can be a little bit scratchy.

We will ring your parent or carer before you come back to hospital again to check you are feeling well and to share your test results.

If everything is ok we will know it is safe to go ahead with our plans.

If either of you do have Coronavirus (COVID-19) we will be able to rearrange your appointment and tell you what to do next.



On the day you come to hospital...

We are asking all parents, carers and children over the age of eleven to wear a face covering whenever they come to hospital. Please ask your grown up to show you our leaflet and video about this. It is on YouTube if you search for 'ESNEFT child's guide to PPE'. The face mask or covering means you can still speak and breathe and people can still speak to you. It is to protect you and keep you safe.
